The Prompt Analysis Template requires you to map out how you would answer each prompt by stating a claim, finding evidence to support your claim, and analyzing the evidence.

***You are not writing a complete paper at this time. We will use these prompts for discussion and presentations when school resumes.

Prompts

Prompt 1: In the novel, *To Kill a Mockingbird*, Atticus Finch said, "*First of all, if you can learn a simple trick, Scout, you'll get along a lot better with all kinds of folks. You never really understand a person until you climb into his skin and walk around in it.*" Many critics and readers of both novels, me included, feel empathy and remorse for Eliza, Frankenstein, The Monster, and other characters. Why would such characters evoke this feeling in the readers? Analyze instances where empathy might be warranted. When we feel empathy towards others, is it helpful? Why or why not. Explain your answer using both novels as reference.

Prompt 2: Robert Louis Stevenson believed that "*In each of us, two natures are at war – the good and the evil. All our lives the fight goes on between them, and one of them must conquer. But in our own hands lies the power to choose.*" The concept of Good versus Evil is a prevalent theme in both novels. Explain this concept in detail. How is it relevant? Is there a clear winner? At what cost? Use characters and specific situations to explain your answer. Be specific and reference both novels.

Prompt 3: Arthur Conan Doyle once said, *"When once your Point of View is changed, the very thing which was so damning becomes a clue to the truth."* What does he mean? Compare and Contrast the POV for both novels? Look closely at the use of emotions or lack thereof. Examine the writing style of the two authors. How are their stories told? How would the novel change if written differently? One is a frame story, and one is a drama? How significant is this? Be specific and use both novels as reference.

Prompt 4: American inventor, Charles Kettering once said, "*Every father should remember one day his son will follow his example, not his advice.*" What does he mean? How does this quote fit with the theme of the two novels? How is the concept of "Nature vs. Nurture" prevalent in both? Do you agree with this age-old debate? Why or why not? Use the novels for evidence to support your claims.

- 7. Wrap-up your final thoughts on this prompt?
